An Interview with Manasi Mule:
Professor and Placement Coordinator at
M.L. Dahanukar College of Commerce.

As teachers, we need to treat students like our own children.

1) What motivated you to pursue a career in teaching and were there any significant mentors or experiences in your life that influenced your choice?

To start with, I want to take this opportunity to thank Prof. Dr. Kanchan Fulmali Ma'am for having my interview in the Student Press. To answer your question, yes, the presence of a significant mentor in my life did help me pursue a career in teaching. You see, I never wanted to be a teacher in the first place, and while I enjoyed being on stage, anchoring events, and addressing a large group of people, I was reluctant to do that in front of my classmates, for they knew me and their judgments bothered me. One day, in college, Riana ma'am, my English teacher, who I am still in touch with, made me stand in front of 135 students. At that moment, I had tears rolling down my eyes, and despite knowing the answer to the question that was asked, I kept quiet. She had a significant impact on my life. In those two years of college, she encouraged and pushed me forward for everything that she could. Ma'am taught me that as teachers, we need to treat students like our own children, besides telling me that this profession cannot be taken only for survival. Riana ma'am was the first person to tell me that I could become a good teacher after I stood confidently on stage. It was at that moment that I thought of teaching as a career. It's my trust in her and the fact that she will never lead me down the wrong path. She has truly looked after me like a mother looks after her own kin.

2) For someone who started her career teaching students of a different course, what was it like when you were asked to teach media students? And how long did it take for you to settle in?

I'll never forget what my mentor told me: "Accept things with an open mind." I started at Dahanukar College with a B.COM and subsequently went to SFC. I started out with BBI and then moved on to BAF, followed by BMS. The BBI department was a good place to start because it taught me everything from the ground up. My first BMM batch was a life-changing experience for me because they were so different from commerce students. Commerce students are crystal clear about what they want. However, it was all about glamour in the media. As a result of this, I had to reinvent myself, which came naturally to me. I had to do a lot of studying in the beginning because the examples I offered to commerce students didn't work for media students. I understood the glamour field; here, it seems like people expect you to be a specific way. So, with an open mind, things went quite smoothly.

3) Compared to before, what has changed in BMM students?

My first batch of BMM was in 2012 or 2013. Students back then had limited exposure to the course. They had a different image in mind and would associate this course with glamour. Sure, part of it is glamorous because of the media attached, but that's not all there is in this course. Today, students are more aware of what they are getting into, and one reason for that is technological advancement. In the previous batches, I would invite guest speakers to explain to students about advertising and journalism. Speaking of journalism, we have seen a rise in students' participation.

4) As the placement coordinator, what qualities students need to work on before going for a job interview? Besides, could you also tell us about your expectations when they sit across from you?

First and foremost, I enjoy being there because seeing the students' emotions on the day they receive their offer letters makes me feel as though I have helped them in some way. I'd like to talk about a student who was hired by Asian Paints last year, from TY B. COM. "Yes, ma'am, this is me; I found myself," he said when he finally arrived to meet me. My contentment is actually greatly increased by their joy at landing the job. At the very least, I could have been able to influence someone's career. When I was told I should become a teacher, I wasn't too interested, but it gradually became my love. There was a period when people told me that if I didn't have a well-paying job, I should quit, but my desire never faded.

So my biggest passion about placement may be the happiness of students that touched me more than anything. I felt very much peaceful when students used to come and told me that they have cleared the interviews. Even though we emphasize the importance of a CV and interview skills right from the first year, it often takes until the third year for students to fully grasp their significance. Nonetheless, I am proud of them because, despite all of this, kids do admirably in their interviews. The exposure you all receive is far superior to what we or previous generations received.

5) You weren't initially passionate about being a teacher. At what point did you realize that this was your true calling?

I was in 12th grade when a teacher complimented me on how well I spoke. She suggested that I become a teacher. 'Oh, instructor, so how long do I have to talk then? It's a difficult job,' I thought at the time. She was the one who had students waiting in line for career advice. Many of my classmates did not comprehend a course called Ethics when I was studying for my BMS. That was a subject to which I could easily relate. So I began teaching them. We had the freedom to use the chalkboard once the teacher left the classroom. I used to instruct them using a blackboard. They used to record it there. Every time I watched it, I realized that yes; this might be an option for me. If I can do it for my peers, I can do it for others. So, after teaching in a different college for a period of three to four years, I realized that this is what it is. Now I cannot shift careers. Because of my teachings, I am able to sleep peacefully. I'm determined to reach as many students as possible.

6) Lastly, what message would you like to give to our readers through our magazine?

To begin, I feel that one should constantly put in a great deal of effort because everyone has some sort of talent. Everyone has a unique selling point. I believe students should emphasize their hard work and perseverance, and success will always follow them.







Hasnabad Dargah is one of the prettiest mansoleums in the city, made of blue and white stones with two minarets and a blue dome. It's located in Byculla East, Mazgaon, one of the seven islands that made Mumbai. The mosque is made from Rajasthani marbles, the top of the mosque and the interiors are made from real gold. Earlier the mosque was open to all. However, today the entry to outsiders is prohibited. Although even a glimpse of the monument is enough to sweep someone off their feet.

4. Open Railway Museum

museum is on both sides of main

THREADS

Threads is a new app unveiled by Meta that enables users to exchange text updates and participate in online discussions. It was curated and created by the Instagram team. More than 100 million people have used Threads since its launch on July 5. One can access the app by logging in with their Instagram account. Posts can be up to 500 characters long including links, photos and videos up to 5 minutes in length.

When it comes to design and organization,
Threads is very similar to Twitter. It still
lacks direct communications, a reverse
chronological "following" feed, search
capabilities, and trending hashtags. At the
least, former two requirements of the list
must be included shortly. At the moment,
companies, celebrities, and Instagram
influencers dominate the algorithmic feed
on Threads that may not feel like Twitter.
Additionally, it's unclear whether Threads
will be as important during political and
breaking news events as Twitter was. There
is still plenty to learn about this.

It won't be necessary to follow someone on the Threads app if you already follow them on Instagram. The app will, however, give users the choice to allow auto-following on Threads, they already know and follow on Instagram. The app will give you the option to keep your Threads profile private if you want to make sure that only people who follow you on Instagram are able to follow you there as well. However, there is also the choice of pre-approving it.

Your Instagram profile will be closely linked to your Threads profile. The username, display name, and profile picture will all be the same as they are on Instagram on both platforms. A person will immediately be blocked on another service if you block them on one. Users will have the option to follow and unfollow various Instagram and Threads profiles.

Analysts claimed that investors were drooling over the prospect that Threads' connections to Instagram may endow it with a built-in user base and advertising infrastructure that might steal advertising dollars from Twitter, whose new CEO is attempting to turn around the failing operations of the microblogging startup. Recently META stock closed up on 3% ahead of its launch outpacing gains by competitor tech companies as the broader market edged

down.
